ONE MONTH DONOR UPDATE

Hot, dry weather and high winds has made 2017 one of the worst summers on record for forest fires in the interior of British Columbia. Since the first evacuation order was issued on July 7th, over 50,000 people have registered for assistance from the Red Cross. And thanks to donors like you, they are getting the help they need.

Across the province, Red Cross teams have been working to help evacuees by supporting reception centres and group lodging sites with personnel, cots, blankets, shelter supplies, and emotional support. For families who have been able to return home, the Red Cross is also providing clean-up supplies and ongoing assistance to help meet additional needs.

But with hundreds of wildfires still burning, we know that help will be needed in the weeks and months ahead. Your support means the Red Cross *can* and *will* be there for each and every person impacted by these fires.

Like we did for those devastated by the wildfire in Alberta last year, we will continue to stand behind British Columbians during this incredibly stressful and uncertain time. Thank you for your compassion and generosity.
