RED CROSS FACTS AND FIGURES

- More than 5 million earthquake survivors assisted
- Over 14,400 tons of aid provided
- Over 1 million relief items distributed
- Over **230,000** people received medical care at a Red Cross facility
- Over **19,000 families** provided with safe shelter solutions
- The Canadian Red Cross supported **2,125** families with cash grants for rent
- **29,000** hygiene kits distributed to earthquake survivors
- Over **2,300** patients treated at Canadian Red Cross cholera treatment centres
- 300,000 families received door-to-door cholera prevention information
- Over **50,000 households** reached through awareness sessions on hygiene and sanitation, violence prevention, and on the prevention of diarrhea and malaria

- More than **700 volunteers and supervisor**s now trained on community-based health and first aid promotion
- 163 trained volunteers increasing awareness on various cholera prevention means, including how to treat water before drinking and washing your food
- More than 500,000 soaps and 40,000 mosquito nets distributed
- Over **420,000** people reached through violence and abuse prevention efforts
- **125 school officials** from 43 schools trained in violence prevention
- The Canadian Red Cross is supporting the construction of 1 Haitian Red Cross regional branch office and the expansion of another
- 9 high-risk communities provided with a tailored package of training and materials on helping to reduce the risk of future disasters

BUILDING HEALTHIER COMMUNITIES

As Haiti recovers, the Red Cross is planning for a healthier future for the country. Longterm development in health systems and infrastructure is critical to Haitians' well-being. Over five years, the Canadian Red Cross will invest \$35 million in a health program that will improve access to quality health services for mothers, newborns and children, as well as build stronger communities in terms of communitybased health and first aid.

This program will work with local and Canadian partners to maximize positive, long-term health outcomes for Haitians. It will rebuild the departmental hospital in Jacmel, which is expected to be completed in March 2015, rehabilitate four health centres, train health care professionals, improve health education at the community level, and strengthen health systems through improved capacity in health program planning, management and evaluation.

Health has been a priority for the Red Cross since day one after the devastating 2010 earthquake. The Red Cross has provided emergency healthcare, vaccinations, clean water and basic sanitation to more than 230,000 people, educated more than 4.3 million people through hygiene promotion activities, and reached more than 2 million people through community-based health and first aid services.



REBUILDING HOMES

As part of overall sheltering efforts, the Canadian Red Cross directly provided longerterm shelter to approximately 7,500 families in and around Jacmel and Leogane. The shelters that were built were dependant on the assessment of needs, land availability, the clearing of debris and other critical issues brought about by such a large-scale disaster.

The Canadian Red Cross has been a major partner in the reconstruction efforts in Haiti and, with support from the Government of Canada, has provided over 19,000 families with safe shelter solutions. The completion of the Canadian Red Cross shelter program therefore marked a major milestone in the recovery efforts. Canadian donations also funded an additional 9,412 shelter solutions for families through the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies. To meet the growing needs of 279,000 still internally displaced people in Port-au-Prince, the Canadian Red Cross has also supported 2,125 families with cash grants for rent as part of the larger Red Cross resettlement program. The initiative aims to decongest the camps and find safe longer-term shelter solutions for families.

In addition to shelter, the Canadian Red Cross continues to work with other National Red Cross Societies to ensure that the on-going needs of families and their communities are met, such as adequate water and sanitation systems, programs to help people gain employment and proximity to social infrastructure.

2010 HAITI EARTHQUAKE APPEAL FINANCIAL UPDATE

The Canadian Red Cross has received over \$212 million from generous individuals, corporations, provincial and local governments and the Government of Canada to support Red Cross efforts in Haiti.

As of September 30, 2013, the Canadian Red Cross has committed \$207 million to specific projects of which over \$174 million has been spent.

PLANNED SPENDING


The Canadian Red Cross has developed plans to spend these funds over a 10 year period in order to best support communities to recover and rebuild.

In addition to spending to date, the funds received will be used to implement programming in community-based health, violence prevention, and disaster preparedness. It will also be used to rebuild health infrastructure and strengthen the disaster response capacity of the Haitian Red Cross.

The bulk of donations will be spent during the recovery phase, where careful planning and community engagement is vital to ensuring a sustainable result.
